+ Tenth Sunday after Pentecost Order for Worship

This week is the first of five consecutive Sundays with gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as Bread of Life. In today's reading, Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.

⁴² A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing food from the first fruits to [Elisha,] the man of God: twenty loaves of barley and fresh ears of grain in his sack. Elisha said, "Give it to the people and let them eat." ⁴³ But his servant said, "How can I set this before a hundred people?" So he repeated, "Give it to the people and let them eat, for thus says the LORD, 'They shall eat and have some left." ⁴⁴ He set it before them, they ate, and had some left, according to the word of the LORD.

Second Reading – Ephesians 3: 14-21


¹⁴ For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, ¹⁵ from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. ¹⁶ I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, God may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through God's Spirit, ¹⁷ and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. ¹⁸ I pray that

you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, ¹⁹ and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

²⁰Now to the one who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, ²¹ to God be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Acclamation

Gospel – John 6: 1-21

P: The holy Gospel according to St. John. C: Glory to you, O Lord.

¹ Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. ² A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. ³ Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. ⁴ Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. ⁵ When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" ⁶ He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. ⁷ Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." ⁸ One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, ⁹ "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" ¹⁰ Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. ¹¹ Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the

fish, as much as they wanted. ¹² When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." ¹³ So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. ¹⁴ When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

¹⁵ When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

¹⁶ When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, ¹⁷ got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. ¹⁸ The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. ¹⁹ When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. ²⁰ But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." ²¹ Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

When the greetings of peace have concluded, please be seated.





- Please step to the side to consume the wine or grape juice.
- *Feel free to kneel at the altar rail for prayer after receiving the sacrament.*
- As you return to your pew, glasses may be returned to the empty trays on either side of the center section.
- A blessing will be provided for anyone who does not yet receive the sacrament.
- All are invited to join in singing the hymns during Holy Communion.





- Welcome to Today's Preacher, The Rev. Dr. Dale B. Snyder of Bethel AME Church in Pittsburgh! – Over the past few years, St. Andrew has been blessed to develop relationships and friendships with our siblings in Christ at Bethel AME Church in the Hill District. We have supported Bethel and their pastor, The Rev. Dr. Dale B. Snyder, in telling Bethel's story in seeking reparations for the loss of their church building and property to eminent domain in the 1950s. St. Andrew hosted one of Bethel's Table Talks, and people of the congregation have participated in worship services, joint choirs, and celebrations with Bethel, especially on Juneteenth. As our two congregations continue working together, we are so pleased to welcome Pastor Snyder to St. Andrew today! We thank him and the people of Bethel for his time and gifts in bringing God's Word to St. Andrew!
- The Rev. Dr. Munther Isaac of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land to Speak at Bidwell United Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh on Thursday, August 1st, at 7:00 p.m. Palestinian pastor and international speaker Rev. Dr. Munther Issac will be at Bidwell United Presbyterian Church on Thursday, August 1st at 7:00 p.m. Rev. Issac speaks to the suffering of the Palestinian people and the silence of Christian Churches. Rev. Dr. Isaac is a 10th generation Palestinian Christian and pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Christmas Church in Bethlehem, the Lutheran Church in Beit Sahour, and academic dean of Bethlehem Bible College. He brings a theologically challenging voice to Christian congregations. The central question of his work is "How can we redeem religion in terms of being part of the solution in Israel and Palestine?" Please consider hearing Rev. - Monthly Reparations Offering Next Week, August 4th, during Worship Jesus' parable from Luke's Gospel about a compassionate Samaritan provides an example of how God's people are called to work for healing and repair for our neighbors, independent of who or what caused harm. In light of this, St. Andrew has made a commitment to reparations in regard to African American spiritual songs used in our worship. The text and music of most hymns is attributed to specific authors, with copyrights in place, usage reported, and royalties paid to those whose works are featured in worship. With African American spirituals, this is not possible. In response to many years of such uncredited use, St. Andrew invites the congregation to give a reparations offering. Funds received in worship will be donated to our siblings at Bethel AME Church, whose land and building were taken from them in the 1950s, to fund their development in the lower Hill District.
